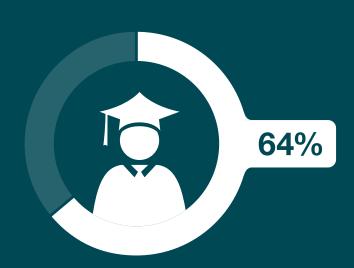




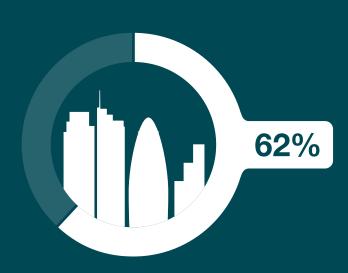
## More than two thirds of job-seeking students and graduates say they are not completely mentally healthy



**64%** of students and graduates believe disclosing a past or current mental health issue will **hinder** their chances of securing a first job



83% are more likely to apply to an employer who is open about its commitment to mental health at recruitment stage



**62%** of students and graduates are concerned about the **impact** a career in financial, legal and professional services will have on their **mental health** 



69% of students and graduates would **not** describe themselves as **completely fit** and healthy from a **mental health** perspective

The most common mental health issues for students and graduates include:

58% anxiety

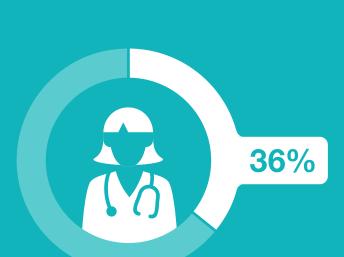
48% depression

33% panic attack

The most common mental health issues experienced by students and graduates include anxiety (58%), depression (48%) and panic attacks (33%).

18% of respondents also stated they have self-harmed.





36% have sought professional help from GP, counsellor or psychiatrists



41% would try to avoid ever disclosing that they lived with a long-term mental health issue



Only 40% would feel comfortable discussing mental health concerns with their manager



Compared to 73% who would be comfortable talking about physical health issues (such as flu, diabetes and back pain)

Common concerns for early careers job seekers include:

74% meeting the expectations of new employers

78% cost of living in a big city

62% the impact on their mental health
